## **Reflection:**

This week our readings calls us to faithfulness and hope. The message of all of the readings is that our world is not random, but is following a divine purpose, and that God will finally bring an end to evil and rescue God's people - and all of creation from brokenness and darkness. In the Wisdom of Solomon reading. God's power is praised, and the assurance of God's hope is remembered. In Psalm 86 the care for God's people is being expressed in practical situations, while praying for God's protection to continue. Paul, in his letter to the Romans, reminds his readers of the gift of God's Spirit, and the hope that this gift brings, while teaching them that the freedom from sin and death that they hope for is not just for them but for all creation. Finally, in Jesus' parable he explains why good and evil exists side by side. He offers the hope that the time will come when evil is finally done away with, and only goodness remains. It may seem naïve to speak of good finally overcoming evil. In the face of corruption, poverty, climate change, war and inequity, it may appear that the opposite outcome is far more likely. However, as people of faith, we do not have the luxury of pessimism, cynicism and despair. If we truly believe that God is alive and active in our world, then we must trust that our world is not random, but is moving purposefully forward the full reign of God's kingdom. We are called to live together - "wheat" and "weeds" together - trusting in the hope that the time will come when evil and injustice are removed from our world. All that is left for us, then, is to embrace our hope and make it available to all.
