A reading from the book of the Prophet Isaiah

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light;
those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined.

The Lighting of the Advent Candles

First candle

We light this first candle to remember loved ones who have died. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices, and we hold them before God, giving thanks for their lives.

We take a moment to remember those who have died and name them, aloud or in the silence of our hearts.

O God of love,

we commend to you our loves ones who have died. We give thanks for them and we entrust them into your everlasting love and care. We ask that your presence will uphold us in this Christmas season as we miss them. We ask that we will find joy in the small things, in the beauty of the world and in those we meet.

Second Candle

As we light this candle, we ask you to redeem the pain of other losses – the loss of relationships through divorce or separation; the loss of job, of home, of security, of good health, of joy in our lives and in the lives of those we love. As we name all our losses we gather them together and lay them at your feet. And we ask that you will place in to our hearts the gift of peace.

We take a moment to remember our losses and name them, aloud or in the silence of our own hearts.

O God of compassion, we come before you in need of wholeness and peace. Although we want to place our trust in you, Our hearts are often fearful and anxious. We forget that you are with us and that your rod and staff comfort us. Help us to trust in you with all that life places in our path. Help us to notice you in all things. Give us patience – and make us ever more aware of your presence and guidance. O Prince of Peace draw near. Amen.

Third candle

The third candle we light for ourselves and for those who long for a deep sense of God's love and purpose. We remember those who society often forgets: the homeless, the hungry, the poor, and the imprisoned. We place into your hands all those who are feeling lost, isolated or rejected at this time.

We take a moment to remember those in need of our prayers today and name them aloud or in the silence of our hearts.

Your word is a light to our path and a lamp to our feet. Lead us Lord, direct our paths. Give us hearts that seek you. Give us discerning hearts with the courage to seek your will for us and to persevere. Renew us in the power of the Holy Spirit to walk with you the path you set before us. Amen

Fourth Candle

As we light the fourth candle, we ask you to renew in us the gift of hope which God offers to us through the birth of Christ; a hope that doesn't deny the agonies of the world; a hope that sustains us as we trust in God and his promise to be with us.

O God,

lift our hearts and let our cry come unto thee. Fill our hearts with a deep confidence in your care. Teach us to know and help us to see the light of your goodness that shines into all our darkness. Where we see your love in life, help us to know it, trust it and grow in its power. So may our lives bring comfort and encouragement to others. We ask this in the name of Jesus Christ, the light of the world. Amen.
