Palm Sunday

The Liturgy and Procession of Palms is the first liturgical action in Holy Week which reminds us of the main events in the last week of Jesus' ministry. This year, the procession will be symbolic. Procession of the palms, symbolic or otherwise, is important as it not only reminds us of what happened then, but it is also an act of praise to Christ the King who reigns and triumphs on the cross – and it reminds us of our own readiness to take up our own cross and follow him – our crucified and risen Lord, as we go with him to the place of suffering and death.

The reading of the Passion Gospel takes us into the heart of Holy Week. Although the services throughout this week are shaped by the historical commemoration of the events of Jesus' last week of his earthly life, taken together they form an extended celebration of the victory he won over death. The Passion Gospel reminds us that the kingly power of Christ is the power of self-giving love alone.

Today we come together to begin this solemn celebration in union with the Church throughout the world. Christ enters his own city to complete his work as our Saviour, to suffer, to die, and to rise again. Let us go with him in faith and love, so that, united with him in his sufferings, we may share his risen life.

Palm crosses or other plant branches are held up whilst this prayer is said

let these palms be for us signs of his victory
and grant that we who bear them in his name
may ever hail him as our King,

The Palm Gospel

Hear the Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to *Mark*.

All Glory to you, O Lord.

¹When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples ²and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'"

⁴They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, ⁵some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. ⁷Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. ⁸Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. ⁹Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! ¹⁰Blessed is the coming kingdom of our Ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" ¹¹Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Prayers of Penitence

The president invites the people to confess their sins using these or other suitable words

The sacrifice of God is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart God will not despise. Let us come to the Lord, who is full of compassion, and acknowledge our transgressions in penitence and faith.

Father eternal,
All giver of light and grace, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour, in what we have thought, in what we have said and done, through ignorance, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We have wounded your love, and marred your image in us. We are sorry and ashamed, and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past; and lead us out from darkness to walk as children of light.
Amen.

The president says

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Collect

Let us pray for a closer union with Christ in his suffering and glory.

Almighty and everlasting God
who in your tender love towards the human race
sent your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ
to take upon him our flesh and to suffer death upon the cross:
grant that we may follow the example of his patience and humility,
and also be made partakers of his resurrection;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and forever.

The Liturgy of the Word

The Passion Reading

Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory.
Christ humbled himself and became obedient unto death,
even death on a cross.

Therefore, God has highly exalted him
and given him the name that is above every name.

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to *Mark*.

(No response is made)

As soon as it was morning,
the chief priests held a consultation
with the elders and scribes and the whole council.
They bound Jesus, led him away,
and handed him over to Pilate.

Pilate asked him,

‘Are you the King of the Jews?’

He answered him, ‘You say so.’

Then the chief priests accused him of many things.

Pilate asked him again,

‘Have you no answer?’

See how many charges they bring against you.’

But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed.

Now at the festival he used to release a prisoner for them,
anyone for whom they asked.

Now a man called Barabbas was in prison
with the rebels who had committed murder
during the insurrection.

So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate
to do for them according to his custom.
Then he answered them,
'Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?'
For he realized that it was out of jealousy
that the chief priests had handed him over.
But the chief priests stirred up the crowd
to have him release Barabbas for them instead.
Pilate spoke to them again,
'Then what do you wish me to do
with the man you call the King of the Jews?'
They shouted back, 'Crucify him!'
Pilate asked them,
'Why, what evil has he done?'
But they shouted all the more,
'Crucify him!'
So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd,
released Barabbas for them;
and after flogging Jesus,
he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace
(that is, the governor's headquarters);
and they called together the whole cohort.
And they clothed him in a purple cloak;
and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him.
And they began saluting him,
'Hail, King of the Jews!'
They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him,
and knelt down in homage to him.
After mocking him,
they stripped him of the purple cloak
and put his own clothes on him.
Then they led him out to crucify him.

They compelled a passer-by,
who was coming in from the country,
to carry his cross;
it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus.

Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha
(which means the place of a skull).
And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh;
but he did not take it.
And they crucified him,
and divided his clothes among them,
casting lots to decide what each should take.

It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him.
The inscription of the charge against him read,
'The King of the Jews.'
And with him they crucified two bandits,
one on his right and one on his left.
Those who passed by derided him,
shaking their heads and saying,
'Aha! You who would destroy the temple
and build it in three days, save yourself,
and come down from the cross!'
In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes,
were also mocking him among themselves and saying,
'He saved others; he cannot save himself.
Let the Messiah, the King of Israel,
come down from the cross now,
so that we may see and believe.'
Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.
When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land
until three in the afternoon.

At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice,
'Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?'
which means,
'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?'
When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,
'Listen, he is calling for Elijah.'
And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick,
and gave it to him to drink, saying,
'Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down.'
Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

Here all kneel or stand and pause for a short time.

And the curtain of the temple was torn in two,
from top to bottom.
Now when the centurion,
who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last,
he said,
'Truly this man was God's Son!'

This is the Passion of the Lord.

Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally,
come at least spiritually into my heart.
I embrace You as if You were already there
and unite myself wholly to You.

Amen.**
